My history with the Belted Galloway breed began in 1997 when I started working for Sue and Gene Drew at Driftwood Plantation in Awendaw, South Carolina. My backstory is that I grew up on a cattle farm in Indiana raising Charolais cattle. We were a cow-calf operation, showing cattle, and marketing our breeding stock through many venues. I am also a Boilermaker and earned a degree in animal science at Purdue University.

South Carolina's temperatures in the summer reach 100 degrees, and humidity factors are usually well into the high 90's which is a challenge. Combining those factors with the furry Scottish-bred Belted Galloway breed proved another challenge. Sue and Gene Drew's dream to raise Belted Galloway cattle in the Deep South was solved, to a great extent, by incorporating a water system that provides clean water to canals, various sized ponds for cattle to access as needed, along with a simple sprinkler system set up in smaller enclosed areas around the handling facility.

The Drews didn't approach anything in a small way. Driftwood Belted Galloways became devoted to raising quality performance-tested beef cattle. Three hundred acres abutting the salt marsh comprise the grazing land. The cow herd grew to approximately 200 head of registered performance-tested Belted Galloways. We felt that producing new genetics was very important for the breed. Artificial insemination and finding good out-cross bulls were part of our program. We participated in all Belted Galloway sponsored sales, exhibited cattle throughout the United States, and devoted ourselves to Belted Galloway youth. We established an agreement with the UT-Martin to hold cow camps for youth, we hosted interns at the farm, and the Drew's funded travel for youth to attend national events. To this day, Driftwood continues our semen, steer, and heifer youth

projects.

During the 2000's, I served on Council, and I was the leader of our youth organization, as known in those days, the Beltie Youth Group. My favorite memories are of those young people who were mentored to learn about the beef industry – not just Belted Galloway cattle. I have been fortunate to be able to travel the United States, Canada, Scotland, New Zealand, and Australia to see Belted Galloway cattle. I also was honored with the opportunity to judge Belted Galloway cattle in Melbourne, Australia.

Fast forward to 2018, and the legacy that Sue and Gene Drew provided has continued. My wife Pam and I own the Driftwood Plantation herd that now numbers nearly 60 head. We no longer show on a yearly basis, but develop potential show animals, breeding stock, bulls, and sell semen/embryos. We continue to graze the herd pretty much year-round. The herd's diet consists of either green grazing through the regular growing season or planted grazing in the fall and winter months with supplemental hay. Feed is used to supplement the younger animals' diets; the cattle are screened for potential diseases. We calfhooed vaccinate all heifer calves as well as a semiannually update pertinent vaccines following our aggressive protocol.

My interests, as I serve on Council today, continue in production management in the identification of those genetics that will allow a moderately-framed 1000- to 1100-pound Belted Galloway female to milk and use her body condition to wean a 500-pound calf. I also believe that DNA collection of Belted Galloway sires, and the opportunity to manage hypotrichosis in the Belted Galloway breed, are real tools to advance the breed. I have never made a dime doing anything else in my lifetime, other than raising cattle. The cattle business has given me the opportunity to meet many wonderful people!

Get your steers ready! The High Steaks Carcass Contest will be held in conjunction with the 2019 GLBGA Field Days on June 8-10, 2019. This event will be the second championship for Belted Galloway carcasses ever held. There will be two division: Grain fed and Grass fed.

We want to make sure this is a world-class event, so we are offering some serious cash awards. The prizes are \$500 for first, \$250 for second, and \$125 for third, along with bragging rights within the Society. The event has sparked quite a bit of interest. The entry rules and forms are available on beltie.org under the Events Calendar or the GLBGA website in the upcoming events. (GLBGA reserves the right to prorate premiums based on the number of entries.)

Entries should be postmarked by May 15, 2019. Entries are limited. Steer check-in will be on Monday, June 4, 2019, from 8 am to 5 pm, and Tuesday, June 5, 2019, from 7 am to 9 pm. If you are coming or hauling in early, your beef can be held and rested

at my farm, Wisconsin River Farm or one of several other GLBGA farms.

Beef will be slaughtered on June 5th. On June 7th, the beefes will be evaluated by a UW Extension livestock specialist according to meat industry standards. During the field day events, the beef carcasses will be available for viewing and the prizes awarded. As part of the tour, Belted beef tasting will take place.

“If I enter the contest what will I do with my beef?” Contestants will have several options. Wisconsin River Meats can prepare your beef for you. If prior arrangements are made, Wisconsin River Meats will have your beef processed to your specifications, frozen and ready to go home with you on Sunday. We will open our store on that day for you to pick up your beef. You also can leave it hang longer and pick it up at a later date.

Another option if you act early, will be to market your steer to Wisconsin River Meats. Wisconsin River Meats will buy grain fed Belted steers that grade select or choice. We will pay for them at the Wisconsin market price for the hot hanging weight. You can call John at any time for current market prices.

The High Steaks Carcass Contest will be an outstanding opportunity to see how your steers stack up against the best of our breed and a chance to make a name for yourself and your farm. This is a chance to earn some serious bragging rights as well as being an important part of our 2019 GLBGA Field Days.

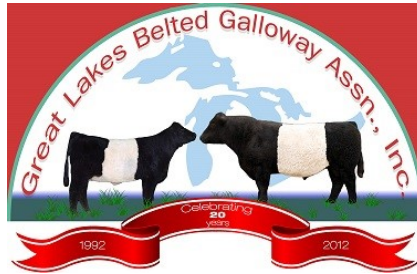

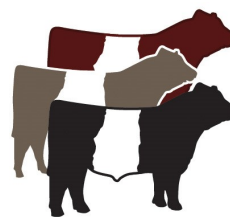
2018 Mandatory Testing Requirements

All bulls born on or after January 1, 2018 are required to be DNA and hypotrichosis tested before registration. Fees for the mandatory DNA and hypotrichosis testing are \$65. The Executive Director's office will generate the paperwork for samples to be submitted to UC Davis.

Bulls born on January 1, 2018 or after, may be registered with the CLRC for \$30 *after the DNA and hypotrichosis testing are completed*. Council reduced the registration fee to \$30 for all bulls born on January 1, 2018 or after to accommodate the mandatory testing.

The Executive Director's office will notify the breeder with the test results and an authorization for registration.

Bulls born before January 1, 2018 are not required to be DNA or hypotrichosis tested and fees for registration will remain \$50.

Battling "thin cow disease"

Anyone who has ever owned cattle has asked the question, "Why aren't my cows getting bred?" Undetected diseases plague us and keep us guessing. We must always be vigilant to prevent diseases such as trichomoniasis, bovine viral diarrhea, and leptospirosis from entering the herd. Still, the most impactful disease is probably the most treatable and preventable.

"Thin cow disease" is a plague on many operations. Thin cows come in three varieties: poor genetics (aka hard doers), nutrition shortfalls or a combination of both.

Cowboy math tells us: genetics + environment = outcome. One of the final exams that determines the outcome for the production year is assessed upon pregnancy diagnosis. The outcome of a good conception rate versus a poor one yields a lot of information about the factors of the equation.

When the news of a good conception rate comes in, we pat ourselves on the back, and we determine the cows and the management were aligned. When the bad news comes, it's everyone else's fault. That's just human nature. To determine why a herd had poor conception, producers must be keenly aware of body

condition and answer the question: Why were my cows and heifers too thin or not breeding?

In the era of "more performance is better," cow herds will have increased mature weight and increased nutritional demand. Some published research suggests high-performing cattle have good fertility. This implies nutrition is abundant. When a train is running uphill, it either needs more coal or a lighter load to keep pace.

Late-gestation and lactating cows need planned and appropriate energy along with adequate protein for good conception. This is the environment part of the equation. If we have large cattle, we must manage for a larger amount of energy.

On the other hand, if the feed and forage analysis suggest adequate nutrition is available prior to breeding, thin cows are likely the product of genetics. Genetically thin and narrow cows kill profitability. They need an extra three to six weeks postpartum, and it seems the shovel is never big enough.

This goes for small-, moderate- and large-framed cattle. We must be diligent to select replacements that will maintain an appropriate body condition within the boundaries of the operation's resources. Cows that fatten too easily can also be an issue, but that's a different disease for a different time.

BMP Klara on Display at Purina Farms

Myra and Tony Franks from BMP Farm in Rolla, Missouri were contacted in early 2018 by Purina Farms. Located just outside of St. Louis, Missouri, Purina Farms learned about the Franks herd through a Local Harvest website and asked if BMP Farm would provide a Belted Galloway for a pen display.

Purina Farms has a barn area that allows both adults and children to interact with a variety of domestic animals found on a typical working farm. Debbie Patke, a representative from Purina, explained that when children visit, they often ask if the Holstein cattle that are on display are Oreo cookie cows? Thus, began the BMP Farm's relationship with Purina Farms to lease and display their April 2017 heifer, BMP Klara 42710-B.

Myra shared, "Upon arrival, Klara had only 24 hours to acclimate to the farm before the expected 600 guests arrived on the opening day in mid-March. Her neighbors in the barn area included a very large Holstein cow and a bottle calf on the other side." The animals are displayed in the barn during the day and given access to pasture too. Purina Farms provides all feed specified by BMP Farm and the necessary veterinary services.

The Franks opted for Klara to remain at the farm for the season to maximize exposure of the Beltie breed and their BMP Farm. Breed literature is displayed with Klara, and the Franks stated that they hope that the exposure will be good for all.

BMP Farm is a 141-acre farm just 5 miles north of I-44 at Rolla, Missouri. The farm is home to 60 head of Belted Galloway cattle and sells registered breeding stock and freezer beef.



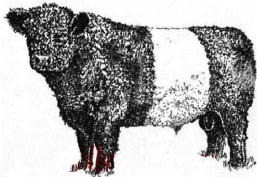
