PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

My first two months as president have been very busy. Council and several committees have had teleconferences in preparation for an exciting 2020. I have also been on the road showing at the Dixie National in Jackson, Mississippi. I had a pair of Belted Galloway

heifers in my show string that garnered much attention from the general public.

Councilman Dick Williams from South Carolina resigned in late December. I want to commend Dick for his service on Council and communicate that he will be missed. Past president, Dawson Masters nominated Pat Hipple from Iowa to fill the vacancy. The Council had a teleconference in mid-January and the nomination was accepted. I would like to welcome Pat Hipple to Council. I am certain that Pat is well-known to the membership. Her husband, Greg, served on Council over the past 10 years.

Pat and her husband Greg live in rural Solon, Iowa, on their farm Sutliff Belties. They have two grown children, who are both married and each of them have two children of their own. Being nominated to fill an unexpired term is an honor for Pat that she takes seriously and she is excited to be able to give back to an organization that she so strongly believes in.


Join us!

CATTLE TWIN TIPS

Have you had twins on your farm? If so, that is pretty remarkable! According to Hoard's Dairyman (1993), the frequency of twins in cattle is about one in every 227 births. Twins may seem like a great idea when it is time to go to market with your calves but there are many risks involved when birthing twins on the farm. Below are some tips in handling twins born on the farm.

- Calves may have to be delivered.
- Once both calves are on the ground, it is recommended that you keep a careful eye on them. Twins are typically less vigorous at birth and may need some assistance to get going.
- Research indicates that approximately half the sets of twins should contain both a bull and a heifer calf. If the set of twins contains both a bull and a heifer, you will need to make note when it is time to make culling decisions. Heifers born with a bull twin are considered "free martins" and are infertile 94% of the time.
- The mother may not accept one of the twins.
- The mother may not produce enough milk for both calves. Supplement the calves with a quality milk replacer to meet their nutritional needs.

Twin calves are exciting and often a surprise on the farm! Have a close relationship with your local veterinarian to help you build a plan to manage healthy twin calves.

THE FIRST BREATHE

Despite our best efforts at bull selection and heifer development, cows or heifers occasionally need assistance at calving time. Every baby calf has a certain degree of respiratory acidosis. Acidosis is the result of the deprivation of oxygen and the accumulation of carbon dioxide that results from the passage of the calf through the birth canal.

The excess of carbon dioxide results in a build-up of lactic acid (therefore the acidosis.) In order to correct the lack of oxygen and the excess of carbon dioxide and its by-products, the healthy calf will pant vigorously shortly after birth. Some calves, however, may be sluggish and slow to begin this corrective process.

It is imperative that the newborn calf begins to breathe as soon as possible. To stimulate the initiation of the respiratory process, a few ideas may help. First, manually clear the mouth and nasal passages of fluids and mucus.

Traditionally, compromised calves were held up by their hind legs to allow fluid to drain from the airways, but now many veterinarians and animal scientists don't recommend this. Most of the fluid that drains from an upside-down calf is stomach fluid, important to health. Holding the calf by its hind legs also puts pressure on the diaphragm from abdominal organs, interfering with normal breathing. It's better to use a suction bulb to clear the airways.

Hanging the calf over a fence also is NOT a recommended method for a sluggish newborn. The weight of the calf on the fence restricts the movement of the diaphragm muscle. The fence impairs the diaphragm's ability to contract and move. This diaphragm activity is necessary to expand the lungs to draw in air and needed oxygen.

A better method is to briskly tickle the inside of the nostrils of the calf with a straw. This will usually cause the calf to have a reflex action such as a “snort” or cough. The reflex cough or “snort” expands the lungs and allows air to enter. Expect the calf to pant rapidly for a few minutes after breathing is initiated. Panting is the natural response that increases oxygen intake and carbon dioxide release and will allow the calf to reach normal blood gas concentrations.

ITCHING & RUBBING IN YOUR HERD? IT MAY BE LICE!

The USDA has estimated that livestock producers lose up to \$125 million per year due to effects of lice infestations. Not only can they be the cause of direct animal performance losses, but also increases wear and tear on facilities and fences. The direct losses to cattle come in forms of decreased average daily gains (documented 0.25 pounds per day reduction in growing calves), skin infections, and potentially blood loss and anemia.

Two Types of Cattle Lice

There are two different types of lice that infect cattle. Biting lice feed on the skin and secretions on the outside of the animal. The other type is known as sucking lice. These species are blood feeders and pierce the skin.

Both types of lice spend their entire lifecycles on the cattle hosts. Off of cattle they survive very poorly and generally only last a few days. However, they can live up to 10 days off host in the right environment, leading to reinfection in groups of animals.

It is important to note that lice are host species specific. This means that cattle lice cannot affect people, horses, or any other species.

Lice Symptoms

Clinical signs of lice infected cattle generally begin with constant rubbing and scratching within the herd. Fences, posts, water troughs, trees and any other stationary object could be subject to damage from this rubbing. As the infection and irritation continues, large hairless patches will become evident on animals.

Further diagnosing the issue beyond the clinical signs requires seeing the adult lice on the skin. Parting the hair will reveal the lice. They are very small but can still be seen. They are roughly the size of a grain of sand. The economic threshold for treatment is roughly 10 lice per square inch.

Lice Treatment

Treatments come in pour-on and injectable formulations. Macrocytic lactones treat internal intestinal nematodes, but also work on external parasites such as lice. It is important to note that the injectable formulations do not work on biting lice since they do not blood feed.

These products are most often used on a herd basis at the end of summer grazing going into winter. Even with herd treatment in the fall, later season lice infections can still occur. This can be due to fence line contact with other animals, or introduction of new animals.

The other option is topical treatments that are non-systemic. These products are typically pyrethroid products similar to what is commonly used to control horn flies during the summer months.

These products are very effective against the adult lice, but to not affect the larvae or eggs. Retreatment is often indicated 14 days after initial treatment.

There is a product available that is a pyrethroid in combination with an IGR (insect growth regulator) that not only works very well against the adults, but also works against the eggs and larvae. Use of this particular product eliminates the need to retreat in 14 days.

Since these topical formulations kill lice by contact, it is extremely important to apply them appropriately to cattle. Most formations call for the pour-on to be applied with full coverage on the topline of animals, from poll to the trailhead.

When treating cattle, it is also important to treat the entire group. Missing one animal could serve as the reservoir for reinvesting the entire herd.

The same thought should be given to new additions to the herd from an outside source. Basic biosecurity such as treating and segregating new additions for 30 days is not only good to reduce risk of lice, it is also a great tool in decreasing introduction of other diseases.
